TRAINING UPDATE: ELECTIONEERING REMINDERS AND TIPS

If you've recently attended one of our training sessions in person or online, you already know that the Secretary of State put out a new advisory that affects electioneering guidelines earlier this year. Since this topic continued to generate questions, we wanted to provide additional clarification. Election Advisory No. 2024-09, which came out April 19, 2024, states "Each early voting and election day polling place must be organized with 100-foot distance markers posted at surrounding outside entrances to the building. During the voting period and inside this protected area, it is prohibited to electioneer, including expressing preference for or against any candidate, measure, or political party, regardless of whether they are or are not on the ballot, or relating to the conduct of an election. Tex. Elec. Code §§ 61.003, 85.036"

This newly updated guidance expands the definition of what can be considered electioneering beyond what is specifically on the ballot. Previously, it was unlawful to campaign for or against any candidate or proposition that was on the ballot within the 100 foot distance markers. Now, any reference to a political candidate or political party can be considered electioneering. The Secretary of State publishes new advisories ahead of each election so we'll be keeping an eve out for additional clarification. We understand this guidance is broad so we want you to use your best judgement when deciding if something might fall under the category of electioneering. Did you know that under federal law, all overseas and military voters have the right to apply for absentee voting using a special form known as the Federal Postcard Application (FPCA)? Whether they be a student studying abroad, military personnel deployed to a remote foreign area, or even a NASA astronaut aboard a spaceflight mission, these U.S. citizens face unique obstacles in participating in elections they are eligible for. The FPCA helps preserve their right to vote, even when they're in space!
